Come and enjoy an evening of Scottish music on Saturday evening, April 8, at 7:30 p.m. at Annapolis Friends Meeting, 351 Dubois Road in Annapolis. Doors open at 7 pm.

Katrine Anderson will be singing songs from her native Scotland, many of which she learned growing up in a very musical family there. She will be joined by an outstanding group of Celtic musicians: Zan McCleod, playing guitar and bouzouki; Robert Spates playing fiddle; and Tina Chancey playing viol de gamba and fiddle.

The cost is \$15 for adults, \$10 for students. All concert proceeds will go to four programs: Council on American-Islamic Relations; a Quaker Working Group on Refugees; William Penn House, a Quaker Center on Capitol Hill; and Survival Press Corps, providing real news about climate change.

A retired World Bank economist, Katrine Anderson has sung extensively in Edinburgh folk clubs and on television there, as well as in the United States, Canada, several African countries, and Brazil. She has issued a CD of classical songs, *A Celebration of Song*, and two CDs of Scottish songs. The first of these, *Ae Fond Kiss*, was nominated a Best Folk Album of the Year by the Washington Area Music Association. A third CD of Scottish songs, *Westering Home*, has just been released and music from it will be performed at the concert.

## ***Thinking About Race***

**Thinking About Race** – (April 2017) James Baldwin

Excerpt from *Review: "I Am Not Your Negro" Will Make You Rethink Race* – by A.O. Smith in the New York Times, February 2, 2017.

"Baldwin could not have known about Ferguson and Black Lives Matter, about the presidency of Barack Obama and the recrudescence of white nationalism in its wake, but in a sense he explained it all in advance. He understood the deep, contradictory patterns of our history, and articulated, with a passion and clarity that few others have matched, the psychological dimensions of racial conflict: the suppression of black humanity under slavery and Jim Crow and the insistence on it in African-American politics and art; the dialectic of guilt and rage, forgiveness and denial that distorts relations between black and white citizens in the North as well as the South; the lengths that white people will go to wash themselves clean of their complicity in oppression."

This column is prepared by the BYM Working Group on Racism (WGR) and sent to the designated liaison at each Monthly and Preparative Meeting. ## **Note From Chesapeake Quarterly Meeting**

Note from CQM

What does a revolutionary Quaker faith and practice look and sound like? This question was addressed by Douglas Gwyn at Chesapeake Quarterly Meeting on March 12. Before the meeting, Douglas handed out this quotation from Margaret Fell on hearing George Fox speak in 1652:

He said, "What have any of you to do with the Scriptures, but as you come to the Spirit that inspired the Scriptures? You will say, Christ saith this, and the apostles say this; but what canst thou say? Art thou a child of the Light and hast walked in the Light, and what thou speakest is it inwardly from God?" This opened me so that it cut me to the heart; and then I saw clearly we were all wrong. So I sat down in my pew again, and cried bitterly. And I cried in my spirit to the Lord, "We are all thieves, we are all thieves, we have taken the Scriptures in words and know nothing of them in ourselves." I saw it was the truth and...I received the truth in the love of it. And it was opened to me so clear that I had never a tittle in my heart against it; but I desired the Lord that I might be kept in it.

Here are a few tidbits from the talk:

Douglas talked about the similarities between Fox's time and ours. Quakers could not cooperate with the political situation at the time. The speaker identified three ways we have an impact, which he called "the three Rs": reform (e.g. legislative change), resist (e.g. refuse to cooperate with the government, such as federal attempts to arrest immigrants), and revolution (required in times of crisis).

Early Friends were biblically saturate. They heard call in that frame. We hear call in a different frame, or read the Scriptures with new eyes.

The early Friends had clarity about what they were called to and they took advantage of moments of decision. Fox didn't let imprisonment be an obstacle. He wrote letters, preached, and became stronger in prison.

Friends formed base communities. Based in their sense of God's calling, heard often in meeting for worship, they went out in pairs to preach. The "Valiant 60" refers to some of those Friends.

Margaret Fell (who married George Fox after she was widowed) spent 4 years imprisoned in Lancaster Castle. From there she wrote – letters and the essay "Women Speaking Justified." She read Paul from a new perspective, having been led by the Spirit to speak as a woman.

A pair of women, in 1652, preached on the streets, were jailed, and spoke of gaining "freedom in the Lord."

Today we must work for reform. We must be faithful.

### **Annapolis Friends Monthly Meeting (AFM) Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business (MfB) Fourth Month, Second Day, 2017**

**Opening:** We began with centering worship. Our Clerk welcomed us to our first Meeting for Business this spring, noting we have a long agenda that has run to 2 pages.

1. Miscellaneous. calendar items and notes (all locations are at AF Meeting House unless otherwise indicated)–

2. For Pastoral Care (PC), MaryB presented a Memorial Minute for Careen (attached). Friends approved. She noted that that our Memorial Service will take place on the Sunday of a busy weekend after our Spring Project Day and Benefit Concert. A few more Friends are needed to assist with set up, clean up, parking shuttle from the Unitarians, and finger food—they should contact Pastoral Care and Marcia. Mary thanks Friends for all their support so far.

3. For Meeting House and Land (MHL), Kim noted that there is a good weather forecast for spring project day and Careen's memorial service. She encouraged Friends to use sign-up sheets for specific tasks. (PC TO DO TRAIL WORK.) A contractor will erect the 20' x 30' tent for Careen's service during the afternoon before the memorial service. Friends approved the cost for tent, plus additional chair rental, subject to a follow-up report by Stewardship and Finance (SF) as to which AFM account should be used.

Kim also relayed information from our Civil Engineering Report on Feasibility of Expansion of the Meetinghouse. The engineer reports the proposed expansion could be approved with only one variance to occupy more than 15% --i.e., 17-18%-- of our buildable area. The County Code would not require more parking. The engineer also suggests assistance from an attorney & contact, in advance, with our neighbors' community association. On this basis, MHL proposes moving forward with our hybrid plan ("B&C") for expansion. Friends thanked MHL and approved moving forward with the conceptual design phase for possible expansion as proposed.

4. For Ministry and Worship (MW), Tom W. reported on various items:

a) Friends approved a special worship- sharing component for our MfW on 4/23/17 as part of our Spiritual State of the Meeting (SSoM) process and report.

b) He offered a spreadsheet showing eight pending applications for AFM membership and a transfer.

c) He also reported that MW has labored with the best methods for ongoing support for Friends in Kenya and has had continued communication with Brennan Kizer-Ball about his ministry & worship group at Xavier University in Ohio.

d) Tom further reported that two Friends have asked Annapolis possible support for "chaplaincy" of Ann Riggs (currently sponsored by Chapel Hill) and of Tim Mullady in connection with the 2017 Boy Scouts National Jamboree. As this function is not part of our local Faith and Practice, MW will do more research on Friends' traditions and FGC's Christian Interfaith Relations Committee ("CIRC") on chaplaincy and will continue these discussions.

e) M&W also has received the suggestion to move our hymn-singing from the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday to another day, so as to avoid a conflict with committee meetings. The committee welcomes comments, will discuss this and report

any recommendation at MfB in May. (Our clerk mentioned that, soon, we also may wish to consider whether reschedule our potluck lunches- now held on the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday each month.)

f) Finally, Tom also noted that many Friends and attenders have raised concerns about “inappropriate” vocal ministry, silence, and occasional late arrivals by Friends and attenders. One Friend noted that a thoughtful balance in this regard is an ongoing concern for new attenders as well as more seasoned Friends. Others commented that our focus might be better centered on how to be more appropriate, welcoming and open in our listening, rather than on discipline as to particular messages. Two Friends also noticed that an online “who-we-are” link might help newcomers know what to expect from vocal ministry. Tom concluded that MW committee has not found unity on this issue and encouraged Friends to join in our Meeting for Learning and worship sharing committee meeting on this topic, both on 4/23.

5. For Peace & Social Concerns (PSC), Barb reported that, per last month’s MfW directions, the committee has continued its discernment as to allocation of 2016 year-end surplus Quaker causes allocation and now recommends three causes: 1) Dave Zaremka’s Transforming Communities for Social Change, 2) Arundel Lodge, and 3) FCNL. Friends accepted and approved this plan.

Barb also reported on the issue of Friends signing public statements, such as the letter to Pres. Trump in support of the DACA policy. (See attached.) BYM’s interim meeting has recommended that local Meetings sign as BYM does not have a formal policy permitting Interim Meeting action. After discussion of our process, all Friends present approved becoming the 869<sup>th</sup> signer of the letter (to be revised that Donald Trump now is “President” and no longer “President-Elect”) and recommending the same letter’s approval by BYM.

We closed Meeting for Business with silence, and transitioned to Meeting for Worship.




**Katrine Anderson** has been singing her native Scottish music for as long as she can remember. A classically trained soprano, she spent much time in Edinburgh singing Scottish songs in folk clubs and appearing on television singing with her sister, Margaret. She has issued a CD of classical songs: *A Celebration of Song*, and two CDs of Scottish songs: *Ae Fond Kiss*, which was nominated Best Folk Song of the Year by the Washington Area Music Association and *Songs of Celtic Myths*, stories about the sea and its creatures: sea witches, mermaids, sea kelpies, and other magical creations. This latest album, *Westering Home* enjoys collaboration with Zan McLeod, Bobby Spates and Tina Chancey. Katrine has given recitals of both classical and Scottish music in the US and Canada. She has also performed in several African countries and Brazil, giving a series of concerts and working with local musicians on integrating African and Brazilian music with Celtic music. She and her husband now spend half the year in Maine where Katrine enjoys making music with local musicians, and performing in a wide variety of venues.



You have already heard violinist **Robert Spates** on countless film scores, TV and radio sound tracks and commercials, and artist recordings. A master of many musical styles and a Scottish fiddle champion, he has toured or performed with legendary figures in the music industry like Aretha Franklin, Smokey Robinson, Christina Aguilera, Usher and others to numerous to mention. A baroque music specialist, he is principal violinist and soloist in Philadelphia's acclaimed Vox Ama Deus Ensemble. In Washington, D.C. he is concertmaster of the Capital City Symphony and was recently awarded a concertmaster position at the Library of Congress, where he performed with the Martha Graham Dance Company.

**Zan McLeod** started his career in the early '70s playing "Southern Rock" on electric guitar. His first forays into Irish music started by forming the band "Touchstone" with Triona NiDhomnaill. Their debut album *The New Land* won the NAIRD award for best Indie album of 1981. Zan played on the GRAMMY winning CD, *Celtic Solstice* with Paul Winter; and two GRAMMY nominated CDs - *Journey with the Sun* with Paul Winter and *Long Journey Home* with the Chieftains. His solo album *Highland Soul* won a WAMMIE in 1995. Pursuing a career as both musician and audio engineer, he established his project studio Tonehouse Recording. Besides recording on over 150 CDs, Zan has also recorded on several film soundtracks. He taught guitar at the Augusta Heritage Center, Boston and McDaniel Colleges and was a founding instructor at Warren Wilson College's "Celtic Week" at "The Swannanoa Gathering" In 2001, Zan released the instructional video *Learn to Play the Irish Bouzouki*. Zan won the Maryland State Arts Council's Individual Artist Grant in 2012 and 2014 and continues to teach, record, and play music around the country.



**Tina Chancey** is director of HESPERUS. She plays early and traditional fiddles and viol on roots music from Sephardic and Irish to Mauchat and Joni Mitchell. She is a former member of the Toss the Feathers, Folger Consort, the Ensemble for Early Music, Blackmore's Night and QUOG.
